Kenilworth Junior High School will work with the district, staff, parents, and our community partners to achieve our SPSA goals. Kenilworth Junior High School has conducted several surveys in order to gather staff, student, and community input during the school year. Each year we implement the comprehensive Youth Truth Survey to students, parents, and staff to gather data on student connectedness to inform actions in support of increased student attendance, school safety, and student connectedness. In addition, pulse survey are implemented twice a year to gather additional information. The information is intended to help identify areas of strengths and weaknesses within our professional relationships in order to work toward building a more equitable school.

#### Classroom Observations

Classroom observations occur weekly and are done both formally, and informally. These occur throughout the year. Formal observations illustrate teacher collaboration, planning, and structured activities through the use of district adopted curriculum. Teachers have been utilizing tools in support of student to student discourse and increased collaboration including various web based applications, and chrome tools to develop 21st Century Skills. Through informal observations students and staff have a sense administration is readily available and this builds an overall sense of togetherness. Additional work is needed in order to increase academic achievement specifically within the special education and EL subgroups.

2021-2022 CAASPP data has set the new baseline for assessment goal setting. In addition, the district is implementing CAASPP IAB's in ELA and has contracted with Math Anex to implement Math assessments four times a year.

Teachers collaborate during Wednesday meeting times, including Professional Learning Networks for horizontal and vertical articulation.

#### Staffing and Professional Development

All staff meet the ESEA requirements for highly qualified teachers.

All teachers have access to district adopted text, coaching support, and professional development for core subjects both on site and by district staff.

All assessments are aligned to adopted state standards.

Ongoing instructional assistance and support for teachers (e.g., use of content experts and instructional coaches) (EPC) Teachers have access to ongoing professional development opportunities through the district, allocated site funding, and recently adopted course materials. Teachers can also request or are assigned a PAPR coach who assists in program/instructional improvement. Kenilworth supports each other by leaning on the specialists right here on campus. These include the Special Education teachers who push into classrooms in order to ensure student accommodations are being met. We also have an ELRT, multiple ELD teachers, and trainings specific to meeting the needs of the California roadmap.

Teacher collaboration by grade level (kindergarten through grade eight [K–8]) and department (grades nine through twelve) (EPC)

Teachers have weekly time allotted for grade level collaboration and professional learning as well as monthly district grade level collaboration focused on CCSS.

#### **Teaching and Learning**

Alignment of curriculum, instruction, and materials to content and performance standards (ESEA)

All students are provided with district adopted curriculum along with a materials that is state approved and aligned to grade level state standards.

Adherence to recommended instructional minutes for reading/language arts and mathematics (K–8) (EPC)

All teachers provide the recommended instructional minutes for all students along with accompanying weekly engagement documentation.

Lesson pacing schedule (K–8) and master schedule flexibility for sufficient numbers of intervention courses (EPC) Intervention courses are assigned specifically to the English and Math departments. Kenilworth utilizes push-in collaboratively taught courses to meet the needs of special education students.

Availability of standards-based instructional materials appropriate to all student groups (ESEA)

Adopted standards based instructional materials along with related technology is provided to all staff and students.

Use of SBE-adopted and standards-aligned instructional materials, including intervention materials, and for high school students, access to standards-aligned core courses (EPC)

All teachers are expected to use state approved and adopted materials, along with standards aligned materials including intervention materials.

#### **Opportunity and Equal Educational Access**

Kenilworth utilizes Title 1 funds and special education resources in order to offer intervention coursework such as Read 180, ELD classes based upon language proficiency, and collaboratively taught coursework in English and Math. We also offer general education and special education study skills courses.

Evidence-based educational practices to raise student achievement

Evidence based educational practices are supported through professional development, partnerships with the district office, Sonoma County Office of Education, and researched based practices.

#### **Parental Engagement**

Resources available from family, school, district, and community to assist under-achieving students (ESEA)

Kenilworth has two academic counselors, three marriage and family therapists, a school psychologist, and two administrators who all play a role in meeting with families of under achieving students. We also partner with community programs such as Mentor Me and utilize public outreach applications such as parentsquare, social media platforms, coffee with the Principal, and recognize academic growth within academic rallies.

Involvement of parents, community representatives, classroom teachers, other school personnel, and students in secondary schools, in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of ConApp programs (5 California Code of Regulations 3932)

The overall site program is reviewed within Site Council, PAC, and staff meetings. Student data is reviewed along with survey results. Our PTSA is very strong as well, but more needs to be done in order to have greater parent and student voice within site council specifically. Our ELAC is a growth area as we have minimal attendance at meetings this year.

#### **Funding**

Services provided by categorical funds include 1.5 bilingual instructional assistants, two guidance counselor, a Bilingual Resource Specialist, support/intervention classes, intervention materials and instruction, along with collaborative time for teacher professional learning and planning.

Fiscal support (EPC)

Fiscal support is provided for student increased achievement through guidance counselors, a response to intervention system, marriage and family therapists, zero period courses, collaboratively taught classes, ELD courses, an ELERT, an after school homework club, as well as grade level professional learning, collaboration and trainings.

#### Involvement Process for the SPSA and Annual Review and Update

The finalized SPSA for the 2023/24 school year is shared with the Principal's Advisory Committee (PAC) and ELAC.

The process for creating and maintaining the SPSA yearly falls to site council. KJHS averages four/six site council meetings per year. The first meeting is to review what we said we were going to do in the SPSA. The second and third meetings consist of reviewing and making changes to the coming years SPSA, and the last meeting is to approve and collect signatures (ELAC, PTSA, STAFF).

#### **Resource Inequities**

As a Title I school, the additional funds we receive are directed towards improving student achievement for under-resourced students in all subgroups. In reviewing the LEA and school-level budgeting, no inequities were found. Parent engagement of all stakeholders continues to be a growth area for the site. We have worked to identify the best times and topics which will help engage our parents and bring them to parent group meetings, especially ELAC. One resource not utilized this year was Parent Institute for Quality Education which we would like to partner with for 2023-2024.

#### **Student Population**






#### 2022 Fall Dashboard English Language Arts Performance for All Students/Student Group






















      - iii. implementation of a schoolwide tiered model to prevent and address problem behavior;
      - iv. professional development and other activities for teachers, paraprofessionals, and other school personnel to improve instruction and use of data; and
      - v. strategies for assisting preschool children in the transition from early childhood education programs to local elementary school programs.
- C. - F. A description of the activities the school will include to ensure that students who experience difficulty attaining proficient or advanced levels of academic achievement standards will be provided with effective, timely additional support, including measures to
  - 1. Ensure that those students' difficulties are identified on a timely basis; and
  - 2. Provide sufficient information on which to base effective assistance to those students.
- G. For an elementary school, a description of how the school will assist preschool students in the successful transition from early childhood programs to the school.
- H. A description of how the school will use resources to carry out these components (described in the Proposed Expenditures for Strategies/Activities).
- I. A description of any other activities and objectives as established by the SSC (described in the Strategies/Activities).

#### The CSI plan shall:

- Be informed by all state indicators, including student performance against state-determined long-term goals (Goal, Identified Need, Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes, Annual Review and Update, as applicable);

In partnership with stakeholders (including principals and other school leaders, teachers, and parents) the school shall develop and implement a school-level TSI plan to improve student outcomes for each subgroup of students that was the subject of identification (Educational Partner Involvement).

#### The TSI plan shall:

- Be informed by all state indicators, including student performance against state-determined long-term goals (Goal, Identified Need, Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes, Annual Review and Update, as applicable); and
- Include evidence-based interventions (Planned Strategies/Activities, Annual Review and Update, as applicable). (For resources related to evidence-based interventions, see the U.S. Department of Education's "Using Evidence to Strengthen Education Investments" <a href="https://www2.ed.gov/policy/elsec/leg/essa/guidanceuseseinvestment.pdf">https://www2.ed.gov/policy/elsec/leg/essa/guidanceuseseinvestment.pdf</a>.)

# Additional Targeted Support and Improvement

A school identified for ATSI shall:

# Single School Districts and Charter Schools Identified for School Improvement

Single school districts (SSDs) or charter schools that are identified for CSI, TSI, or ATSI, shall develop a SPSA that addresses the applicable requirements above as a condition of receiving funds (EC Section 64001[a] as amended by Assembly Bill [AB] 716, effective January 1, 2019).

However, a SSD or a charter school may streamline the process by combining state and federal requirements into one document which may include the local control and accountability plan (LCAP) and all federal planning requirements, provided that the combined plan is able to demonstrate that the legal requirements for each of the plans is met (EC Section 52062[a] as amended by AB 716, effective January 1, 2019).

Planning requirements for single school districts and charter schools choosing to exercise this option are available in the LCAP Instructions.
